We are governed by our church's polity and abide by its discipline. We are friends among our colleagues in ministry, working together, subject to the ordering of God's Word and Spirit.

In our own lives we seek to follow the Lord Jesus Christ, love our neighbors, and work for the reconciliation of the world.

We promise to further the peace, unity, and purity of the church.

We serve the people with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love.
